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Philosophy

As part of MIFF's mission to be a leader in accessible services for cinema-going audiences, we are offering this Sensory Friendly Screening of the film *The Face of the Jellyfish*.

To make this session sensory-friendly, we will be making a number of changes:

- The cinema space will have house lights that remain at an Airplane Night Time level.
- The sound will be reduced by a quarter.
- The space will have different social permissions granted to it, introduced at the start of the screening, that allow Neurodivergent audience members to act as they need to in order to self-soothe and exist comfortably within the theatre.

MIFF has an open-door policy for its film screenings by default, and the same will apply to this session. In addition, there will be a designated Quiet Space for you to remove yourself to in the case of sensory overload or if you wish to have some time to yourself.

All of this creates a unique viewing experience for you. You will be able to rock, stim, hum, filter any sensory input as desired and pace around the cinema as you please.

We are excited to be able to offer you this Sensory Friendly Screening so you get to experience this movie as it was always intended to be.

Getting to the Venue

Below is the basic information:

There are two entrances to ACMI and access is as follows. MIFF recommends using the Flinders Street entrance.

Flinders Street entrance:

- Entry is via a small staircase from Flinders Street through a revolving door and into the Lightwell.
- From the Lightwell, take the large central staircase to Level 1 for the Box Office, HERO and Campari Cinema Lounge.
- Take the staircase on the left past the Box Office to Level 2 for Cinemas 1 and 2.
- For step-free/wheelchair access, take the ramp from Flinders Street through the accessible door to the left of the revolving door. This is operated by a push button with a wheelchair symbol on it.
- Head through the Lightwell foyer to the right past the Gallery entrance to an internal lift and take the lift to Level 1.
- Exit past the Campari Cinema Lounge and take a second internal lift next to HERO, opposite the bathrooms to Level 2 cinema level.

Fed Square entrance:

- Enter Fed Square from Swanston Street and head across the open cobblestoned plaza to the ACMI entrance on the left-hand side.
- Enter through the glass doors onto Level 1 for the Box Office, HERO and Campari Cinema Lounge.
- Take the staircase on the right directly after the glass doors to Level 2 for Cinemas 1 and 2.
- For step-free/wheelchair access, cross the cobblestoned Fed Square plaza to the ACMI entrance onto Level 1.
- Take the internal lift next to HERO to Level 2 to for Cinemas 1 and 2.

The cinema doors have push buttons for assisted opening of cinema doors.

There is a carpet in each cinema, and the walls are steel with inlaid lights.

To borrow a wheelchair for use inside ACMI, present an ID at the Box Office on Level 1 and ACMI can organise one free of charge.

Getting Around the Venue


The recommended entrance is via the Lightwell on Flinders Street.

Enter the space.




In the Lightwell, you can take the stairs up.



Or you can use the lifts.




This will take you to the Box Office.




You can get to the cinema level via the stairs behind, or by turning to your left.



You will find the lift that goes to the cinema level.




The entrance to your cinema will look like this:

ACMI Ground Floor



Map of the Venue (continued)


ACMI Level 1

Film Info

In this Kafkaesque comedy for the selfie age, a woman must confront just what makes her identity her own after her face abruptly changes overnight.

Thirtysomething Marina wakes up one morning with a different face than the one she went to bed with. She doesn't recognise herself, and neither does anyone else who knows her – including her mother and grandmother. Marina begins to fret: Is she legally the same person if her features don't match those on her ID? Does she still have the same DNA? When doctors can't explain why this transformation has happened nor offer her a solution, she sets out on a quest to rediscover who she is.

With absurd, deadpan humour, *The Face of the Jellyfish* ingeniously maps a surreal existential crisis onto the everyday. Marina's mysterious dilemma reveals the centrality of the face to how we define human identity, especially in an age increasingly defined by the relationship between appearance and a multitude of screens. Interspersing live action with animation, biometric graphics and animal imagery, all held together by Inés Copertino's mesmerically eerie electronic score, this audacious film reflects on the nature of genetics, beauty and the self.

- · Description of
 - A major change in appearance
- Scenes of or with
 - Judgement of a woman taking sick leave
 - A cat having its claws clipped
 - Not being recognised by family
 - · Loud, dissonant computer-error tones
 - · Animals in captivity
 - A painting of animals in distress
 - Infidelity
 - A sexual relationship with a later-revealed power imbalance
 - Brief nudity
 - Low-impact sex (no nudity)
 - Club with slow, pulsing music
 - (Briefly) an animated shark approaching the screen to attack
- May induce feelings of dysphoria in some viewers
